



EDITOR'S NOTE

hen I first arrived in the CNMI in 2001, it was in the midst of an election campaign season, a gubernatorial election between Republican Party standard-bearer Juan N. Babauta and then-House speaker Benigno R. Fitial, a battle royale that eventually resulted in a Babauta-Benavente victory. Fitial did eventually win the top post but that was at the next gubernatorial election. More or less nine elections later, CNMI voters will once again troop to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 3, for what used to be called a midterm election but which the Commonwealth Election Commission now refers to as a general election. It's not as combative as most gubernatorial election seem almost sedate by comparison. What sets this year's election stand out, though, is that, for the first time in a long, long while, this year's is truly a contest between two parties, the Republican Party and the Democratic Party, not to mention other independent bets that are also making inroads in the Legislature. This development has created a sort of a pitched camp battle that not only gives voters more choices of candidates but it also makes this electoral season, shall we say, more entertaining? Giving CNMI voters more options will only redound to the good of the CNMI and we hope this will continue in future elections.



What is your vision for the Commonwealth?




standard of living and a greater quality of life as envisioned also in the CNMI Covenant, Article 7 Section.


