Editor's Note

very four years, one of the most exciting political events in the CNMI happens: the general elections, which is when the CNMI electorate chooses a whole slew of political and nonpartisan officials, from the gubernatorial and lieutenant gubernatorial post, right down to the attorney general, legislative members, island mayors, the municipal council and Board of Education members, and as well as the retention bids of judicial officials.

That exciting event happens this year, on Nov. 8, 2022, to be exact. As of the September deadline, there was an overall total of 19,272 voters in the CNMI, surpassing the 18,914 that was recorded during the 2018 elections and assuring that this Nov. 8 general elections will have the highest number of registered voters in the Commonwealth's history. And with general elections being known for having record voter turnouts, it would be safe to assume that this year's election will be no exception.

nomic engine driver, which is tourism, and a flood of federal assistance that hopefully kept everyone on an even footing even as the rest of the world was teetering on the brink of collapse. That is not even taking into consideration that the CNMI is still pretty much in the middle of getting back to its feet after the devastation of two super typhoons, with many buildings still waiting to be rebuilt and the Northern Marianas College still holding some classes in tents. Even now, some Public School System campus buildings still lie in ruins and are still waiting to be demolished and restored. That means this election is coming on the heels of some of the most earthshaking events in CNMI history and the electoral decisions that will be made this Nov. 8 will have repercussions not just on the makeup of the CNMI's leadership in the next four years but will also have a profound effect on the Commonwealth and its economic trajec-This comes on the heels of a two-year pandemic

tory in the years ahead.

This supplement is, therefore, intended to give our voters a look at some of this election's candidates in a bid to give them more insights into the people they would most likely support this election, while also enabling these candidates a chance to reach out to the electorate and convince them of their fitness for the job. We hope this supplement will allow us to meet that goal.

We tried to create a uniform pattern for the candidates' responses and format the questions in a way that would generate responses that were as brief as possible, but some candidates did go outside our standard formatting and we allowed it in many cases if they feel their message will be clearer in that manner. Also, we followed the arrangement as provided by the Commonwealth Election Commission to avoid any appearance of partiality.

A man with a mission

CNMI Supreme Court Justice John A. Manglona is a man with a mission—he wants to continue to be a part of the bench so that he can work with his fellow justices to achieve the goals of modernizing CNMI court operations and spearheading community outreach projects.

Seeing these goals come to fruition has taken much of Justice Manglona's time and energy both on and off the bench, aside from hearing hundreds of cases and authoring opinions both in the Commonwealth Supreme Court and the Supreme Court of Guam. And his continuing desire to contribute is what drives him to run for another retention.

Justice Manglona is a 22year veteran of the CNMI high court, having first served as an appointee of former governor Pedro P. Tenorio in 2000 to the Superior Court as an associate judge, While serving as a judge, then-Guam Governor Carl Gutierrez also nominated Manglona as a designated justice of the Guam Supreme Court for a four-year term. In 2000, Manglona ascended to the CNMI Supreme Court to become an associate justice.

This is his third time to seek retention for another eightyear term. Manglona was first retained by 75% of voters in 2007 and by 78% in 2014. His current term expires in May, 2024

Manglona's desire to continue being a public servant is deep. In his letter of intent he says, "In the past 22 years as a Supreme Court justice, I have worked diligently to serve the interests of our island community. I want to extend my sincere appreciation to all voters whose voices provide the guiding light in our islands. I eagerly await the electoral process and the prospect of further judicial service."

Born on Rota, Manglona attended Guam Catholic schools and graduated from Father Duenas Memorial School. He received his B.A. in Political Economy from the University of California, Berkeley, and graduated from Creighton University School of Law (J.D.) and the University of the Pacific, Mc-George School of Law (LL.M. in Taxation).

Prior to his appointment to the bench, Manglona was in private practice, focusing on probate, corporations, tax, and real property transactions.

Manglona is married to U.S. District Court for the NMI

Saipan Tribune recently sat down with Manglona to talk about his advocacies on and off the bench and his accomplishments during his first two terms as an associate justice.

On improving court operations, "Modernizing our courts is very important," Manglona says, so he has taken leadership roles in some committees while also serving as an advocate and an adviser on some, providing guidance and expertise to the judiciary committees tasked to do the job.

Manglona is proud of the accomplishments court's during these past eight years, He refrains from listing one specific project or program over another since all of the parts of the court that were modernized play an important role in the delivery of judicial services. But overall, he says, the successes can be fully credited to the work of the project committees that are made up of administrative and bench leadership, as well as dedicated staff. Some of the key committees involved in modernization were strategic planning, court technology, e-filing, e-recording, court rules, court security, and infrastructure improvements.

Modernization of court systems was at the very heart of the Judiciary's five-year strategic plan, which has been implemented since 2018. Manglona says that capital improvement projects at the Guma' Hustisia were undertaken under this plan. These included an upgraded security and screening zone (SSZ). With funding from the federal CARES Act, Manglona spearheaded the SSZ building committee to complete the Guma Hustisia's building extension—a task that was done in less than

six months at the height of the pandemic. The building has the latest built-in sanitizing equipment and scanning technology—important features for a building that processes approximately 5,000 visitors monthly.

Manglona also actively participates in the work of the court's technology team, which is currently working on a major revamp of the technology infrastructure. Aside from enhancing connectivity that will allow for greater speed and clarity in virtual court hearings on all three islands. Manglona is also excited to see the outcome of audiovisual enhancements in all courtrooms, which is anticipated to be implemented in 2023.

There is even more exciting news ahead. This November, the Judiciary will finally be implementing an electronic land recording system. Manglona says this is one of the most innovative land documents recording systems in the Pacific region, bringing tremendous convenience to the public in keeping track and accessing land records and documents. This technological enhancement was made possible through the efforts of the court's erecording committee.

Manglona is also deeply involved in one of the Judiciary's major infrastructure improvement—the Data Center. Aimed at meeting the growing needs of the Judiciary's new age technology systems, the Data Center is set for completion in late 2023. The facility will provide a secure environment for the court's new IT equipment and network infrastructure.

Nearest and dearest to Manglona's heart are several programs that the Judiciary implements for the community's benefit. Off the bench, the associate justice has, for over 20 years now, contrib-

uted as a judge and coach at speech and debate competitions. He actively assists with the high school mock trial program as well.

According to Manglona, there are current plans for an in-person mock trial competition to be held in February 2023, after being off for two years during the pandemic.

"I sometimes worry that our students may think they are not as good as students on the mainland," Manglona said. "... Maybe we don't have the resources of mainland schools, but I want people to know that some of my fondest memories include coaching mock trial and 'We the People' teams at national competitions in Washington, D.C. and watching our NMI students hold their own against the best in the country. We have a lot of very talented students."

Manglona is also proud of his participation in the Judiciary's Summer Pre-law Program, which he has helped plan since 1991."I have witnessed firsthand the benefits of having our residents attend this program and later go on to law school and return to serve our island in many capacities."

In fact, the Judiciary's prelaw committee ran a successful program this past summer with a group of 19 students, most of whom have expressed interest in applying to law school.

The associate justice also sees the importance of bringing Supreme Court hearings to schools so that our youth can observe firsthand how the justice system works. "In recent years, we held oral arguments at Kagman High School, Marianas High School, Saipan Southern High School, and Mount Carmel School. The students make a great audience. I hope they find inspiration in seeing some very fine lawyers stand and argue their cases. On Rota and Tinian, we invited and interacted with students in the courtrooms. We will continue to reach out to our youth—to listen to them, understand their viewpoints, and answer their questions." Manglona said.

The Law and the Freshman Legislator program, another program near and dear to Manglona's heart. "I think it's very important and it provides a real benefit to all residents."

The associate justice introduced the program in 2002 after talking to the chief justice of the Washington State Supreme Court. Designed to provide first-term legislators with an overview of the Constitution, the Covenant, the rules for statutory construction, and how to tap into legal research and resources, the program has consistently received favorable evaluations.

"I believe it helps our legislators carry out their duties," Manglona said. "Plans are currently in the works to offer the programs in January 2023 for what could possibly be the largest-ever incoming group of freshmen legislators."

Thanks to the funding support of the Judiciary, the CNMI Bar Association, and the Public School System, these community programs continue to thrive. But despite the successes, Manglona said the programs still face funding woes and the need to find enough volunteers to keep them going year to year.

"I am very grateful for the support we have had over the years from people willing to serve as volunteers. Without volunteers, many of these programs will not continue. So far we have had good luck finding volunteers, and I remain hopeful that these successful and exciting programs will continue long into the future," Manglona said.

The CNMI **Judiciary: Pre- and** post-pandemic

Similar to organizations that want to stay at the forefront of their industry, the CNMI Judiciary believes that continuous improvement is the way for the courts to be efficient and effective in carrying out its mandate of serving the public. With the Judiciary's Strategic Plan in place, and backed by funding from the ARPA and CARES Act, the automation and computerization of court systems became a reality.

"In 2014, the Judiciary lacked the resources and manpower to improve our dealing with substance use and mental health issues in the justice system. The results of the recent evaluation by the CNMI Bar Association showed the need to immediately act on the need for professional development of bench members and court staff. In response, Manglona says the Judiciary will continue to enhance its training programs to address this and other concerns of the NMI Bar Association. "We welcome such evaluations and other input as we all aim at maintaining a firm and effective court system."

While Manglona underscores the importance of advanced technology, improved buildings, successful programs and increased personnel in court operations, he says his main obligation and steadfast resolve are to interpret and apply the law impartially, fairly, and promptly.

Seeking a third term to continue serving as a judicial officer of the CNMI Superior Court is associate judge Joseph Norita Camacho. With his name on the ballot in the retention election on Nov. 8. Camacho is again seeking another six years to

serve as a trial court judge. In his letter of intent to run for retention, the associate judge listed down the extensive work he has done over the span of 11 years, presiding over numerous trials and hearings. Among the trials that Camacho has presided over involve serious crimes ranging from murder, sexual assault and abuse, to robbery, kidnapping, and assault with a dangerous weapon, burglary, theft, and trafficking illegal drugs, among others.

As an associate judge, Camacho has also heard

cases that run the gamut from serious criminal offenses to probate, juvenile, and family court to settlement, and mediation and to performing weddings, and administering oaths of office.

During his first 11 years as a trial court judge, Camacho has issued 200 published opinions that now give guidance on the law. The opinions can be found on the Commonwealth Law Revision Commission website (https://cnmilaw.org/ index.php#gsc.tab=0).

Presently, Camacho handles the whole Probate Court docket for Saipan, Rota and Tinian as well as bail and preliminary hearings. In addition, he also hears Saipan criminal and civil cases and conducts probate hearings that are simultaneously viewed via videoconference at the Rota and Tinian courthouses.

The associate judge also

CNMI law enforcement officers have also benefitted from Camacho's expertise in constitutional law, which he has taught at the Department of Public Safety also given presentations on search and seizure to the **CNMI Customs Division and** Biosecurity and DPS police officers and cadets on Saipan, Tinian, and Rota.

Camacho first ascended to the Superior Court in November 2011 upon a unanimous vote of the CNMI Senate. He received an overwhelming mandate from CNMI voters in 2016 to again serve another sixyear term, which is set to expire in November 2023.

Camacho's role as a public servant is prolific. Prior to his judgeship, he served in various roles as a public servant beginning as a DPS police officer, a prosecutor in the CNMI Attorney General's Office and as a floor leader in the 16th CNMI House of Representatives. He also spent several years in private practice as well as an instructor of business law at the Northern Marianas College.

Bogdan optimistic about the CNMI's Judiciary's future

Superior Court Associate Judge Wesley Bogdan is one of three judicial court officers who is seeking retention in the Nov. 8 general elections.

Bogdan considers his role as a trial court judge a "great privilege and honor and a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity be a part of ensuring the proper administration of justice for the Northern Marianas community," which he considers home.

Bogdan first joined the lower court in November 2017 following a unanimous confirmation by the CNMI Senate on his nomination. His term expires in November 2023 and this is his first time to seek retention to continue serving in the Superior Court for another six years.

As the court's newest associate judge, Bogdan considers his first five years in the lower court the most challenging times

to learn and perform his work as a judge. His first term came at a time when the Northern Marianas faced the aftermath of two catastrophic super typhoons followed by the coronavirus pandemic.

"Super typhoons, broken air conditioners, mold, and a global pandemic—all

Hustisia," Bogdan said.

"COVID and all the ripple adverse effects the disease has caused has affected everyone, including the CNMI. Massive unemployment, increasing drug and alcohol abuse and property crime, social isolation, and the rising costs of living have all

causing the closure of the Guma Hustisia for long periods of time—have required me to grow in this position through highly unusual circumstances. I have actually worked longer in the temporary courtrooms setup [at the Pedro P. Tenorio] Multi-Purpose Building and at the Marianas Business Plaza than I have in the Guma taken enormous tolls on the well-being of a great number of the people who appear in my courtroom." Bogdan said.

On top of the lessons brought by these circumstances are the experiential ones Bogdan learned while on the bench. "A new trial court judge can only learn through experience—by doing all the things a judge must master in order to handle non-stop, alwayschanging, high-pressure circumstances involving people facing difficult legal problems."

Bogdan

Despite these challenges, Bogan remains optimistic about the future of the CNMI Judiciary. "The CNMI Judicia-

ry can continue to positively contribute to this unique place we call home by promoting the rule of law."

The associate judge proudly credits his support team, the Judiciary, and the Commonwealth community for adjusting well to the challenges. "I firmly believe we have become better, more resilient people through it all."

With his role as an associate judge in a close-knit community, Bogdan has learned to practice work/ life balance that helps him stay focused on his job. "My family and the environment are my great balancing factors. Growing up in a very small town in the United States similar in population to the CNMI, I learned early on that everyone in small communities pretty much knew everyone else or was somehow related. It's better to get along and avoid criticizing and confrontation unless it couldn't be avoided."

Originally from New Mexico, Bogdan has planted his roots in the Northern Marianas, which has been his home for the past 30 years. Bodgan first visited Saipan in 1994 at the invitation of two lawver friends and he decided to stay right after meeting the people and the Marianas and experiencing the ocean surrounding Saipan.

He received his B.A. degree from the University of Texas (Austin), after which he attended law school and obtained a juris doctorate from the University of New Mexico School of Law in 1992.

In his 28-year career as a lawyer in the Northern Marianas, Bogdan has held several positions in the CNMI government, beginning in 1995 as an assistant attorney general for the CNMI departments of Commerce and Labor, where he also concurrently served as a judicial hearing officer. He also worked with the Office of the Public Defender.

Immediately prior to his ascent to the Superior Court, Bogdan was the legal counsel and senior policy adviser in the Office of the Governor during Gov. Eloy Inos' and Gov. Ralph DLG Torres' administrations.

Bogdan also worked in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia where he held the position of deputy director of the Legal Department of the Asian Football Confederation and as legal counsel to AFC's then-president Zhang Jilong. He also has experience as a private law practitioner in the CNMI, first as a member of a law firm before establishing his own practice.

In his biography in the judicial system website, Bogdan lists serving as legal counsel and policy adviser on behalf of the Commonwealth during the 2016-2017 Covenant Section 902 Consultations with the Government of the United States as one of his most challenging and rewarding legal experiences.

The associate judge, who has a lifelong passion for soccer, is also one of the founders and is still an active executive committee member of the Northern Mariana Island Football Association.

He has also been active with the CNMI Bar Association and served as head of the Continuing Legal Education Committee and as a member of the Disciplinary Committee. Additionally, he has also taught at the Northern Mariana College and remains active as a part of Judiciary's Mock Trial Competitions.

The associate judge met his wife, Tomoko, on Saipan and they both truly appreciate being a part of this community for almost 30 years.

As a message to CNMI voters, the associate judge has this to say: "Being a judge is difficult and sometimes stressful work and requires the constant weighing of competing interests and complex legal arguments and making difficult decisions on a daily basis. These past five years have been extraordinary and I will continue to approach each case that comes before me with an open mind and I will decide it on the basis of the evidence, the law, and precedent."






